Mercalli Scale

The Mercalli Scale that was invented in 1904 is the one we know today. Mercalli Scales measure the effect of an earthquake at a certain location. Earthquakes can go from "Not felt" to "Catastrophic", which is the worst it can get.

Timeline:

1883 - six categories - Italian Volcanologist - Giuseppe Mercalli

1902 - Giuseppe Mercalli - -second scale

1904 - Adolfo Cancani - proposed adding two more degrees for very strong earthquakes, then creating

a 12-degree scale.

DEFINITIONS

Mending broken items to be used again by yourself or someone else. For example, patching holes in a pair of ripped trousers.

RECYCLE

Materials are collected, broken down and reprocessed into new items. For example, aluminium cans can be recycled infinitely, and into many other aluminium items

Completely reimagine how something could be made to be more sustainable.

REPURPOSE

To use something in a completely new way than it was originally meant to be. For example, you could use an old ladder to make a set of shelves.




PAPER AND CARDBOARD

Paper and cardboard are made of the same thing-wood pulp!

Cardboard is just thicker than paper, and may contain several sheets.

SOME HISTORY

Paper was first invented in China around 220 AD. They later invented cardboard in the 1400s.

Before paper, papyrus was used in ancient Egypt and the

Almost all Australians can recycle paper and cardboard in their recycling bins at home.

Manufacturing recycled paper can use up to 90% less water and 50% less energy than making it from trees

Most cardboard is produced from recycled paper and can be recycled many times over.

- · Paper can be recycled up to eight times
- · Paper and cardboard can be recycled into other products such as packaging. toilet paper and egg cartons.
- · Every year around 3.5 million tonnes of paper and cardboard is used in

Using recycled paper saves trees.

Every 100 reams of recycled office paper that is printed doubled sided will save:

- Two trees
- · Over one tonne of greenhouse gas
- · Almost one cubic metre in landfill



Problems with audio

If the audio is not working, it may be one of the following issues:

1. Check that you are unmuted. Check the menu at the top of the screen. The images below show the unmuted (left) and muted (right) icons.

Check that the correct audio speaker and/or microphone is selected in

meeting options. At the top of the Teams meeting, go to the 'More' loon-

Select 'Audio settings

Under 'Audio settings' make sure that the correct audio devices, speaker and microphone are selected from the down menus.



3. The privacy settings of your device are blocking the microphone. Windows Open Settings' on your device. Under 'Privacy', select 'Camera'. Make sure that the 'Camera access' for this device is turned on. Close all apps and restart your device.

Mac. Open 'System Preferences'. Select 'Security and Privacy'. Under 'Privacy' select 'Camera' and make sure that Microsoft Teams is selected. Close all apps and restart your device.

Teams in not recognising the microphone. Close all other apps on the device.
 If you're using an external microphone, unplug it and plug it back in. Restart your device.
