Primary News


Primary students have been investigating the science of materials and matter, and exploring sound and music.

including timber.










Stage 3


Year 5 and 6 students have been investigating the 3 common states of matter. In music, they have been exploring tempo, pitch and dynamics.











Science News

Agriculture

Agriculture students began the year with plant variety growth trials. Our agriculture plot has produced: peanuts, okra, eggplant, passionfruit and dragon fruit. Citrus trees are all pruned to shape and have produced lemons, mandarins and oranges.



Growing lavender and carrot seeds is the current challenge involving stratification and holed egg cartons.

Bangalow poultry show is 25 May and the school Brown Leghorn cockerel mascot is entered.



Chemistry

At the end of Term 1 a practical day was held for the Year 11 Chemistry students.

The students were involved with conducting seperation techniques, gravimetric analysis and flame tests. The properties of the individual elements were found to be significantly different from those of the compound.



The separation of water was conducted using a Hoffman Voltameter and chemical processes compared to the physical process of boiling water.









Biology

A group of Year 11 Biology students also participated in a Practical Day at school.

The students had practical experience using scientific equipment while covering practical requirements for their course.

New friendships were formed and collegiality between students and their teacher was an added bonus to the day. A big thank you to the students who attended.

Marine Studies


Marine Studies is offered as an elective subject to our students from Year 9-12.
